It was a very special Hall of Fame event at Adelaide Oval in March as we inducted another 6 worthy members into esteemed company. The remarkable depth of talent in South Australia was once again on show with compelling stories told by our recipients who regularly talked of the support from their families.

WHAT WE'VE DONE?

EMPOWERING OUR SPORTING COMMUNITY TRAINING & DEVELOPMENT

Between July 2024 and June 2025, Sport SA delivered a powerful year of education and upskilling, reaching 1,965 participants from 314 sporting organisations across South Australia. Our training calendar featured 102 workshops, covering essential topics like Child Safe Officer, Member Protection, Mental Health First Aid, Grant Writing, Concussion, and Inclusion and Leadership in a Changing Sporting Environment—all designed to meet the real needs of our members.

Importantly, we ensured accessibility for all:

28 online sessions supported participants from both metro and regional areas.

34 face-to-face workshops were held in the metro area.

40 face-to-face workshops were delivered regionally, with 485 regional participants attending in person and virtually.

From sideline trainers to board members, coaches to volunteers, our training programs helped build safer, smarter, and more inclusive sporting environments. Thank you to every individual and organisation who took part—you're helping shape the future of sport in South Australia.

CHILD SAFE OFFICER TRAINING - PARTICIPANT FEEDBACK

The Child Safe Officer training received overwhelmingly positive feedback from participants, with 69% rating the overall quality as excellent and 30% as good. Presenters were praised for clearly stating objectives (81% excellent) and keeping sessions engaging (66% excellent, 27% good). Impressively, 100% of attendees felt the training met their background and needs, and all agreed the session length was appropriate. Handouts were also well received, with 92% rating them good or excellent.

Participants shared thoughtful reflections, noting the training provided a strong foundation for their roles, deepened their understanding of child safety, and highlighted the importance of noticing and responding to subtle signs. One participant summed it up best:

"Small things you wouldn't ordinarily think of can be bigger than they seem."

MEMBER PROTECTION INFORMATION OFFICER (MPIO) TRAINING - PARTICIPANT FEEDBACK

The MPIO training was highly valued by participants, with 78% rating the overall quality as excellent and 22% as good. Presenters were praised for clearly stating objectives (86% excellent) and keeping the session engaging (83% excellent, 16% good). The training was seen as relevant and insightful, with 100% agreeing the session length was appropriate and 95% finding the handouts useful.

Participants appreciated hearing diverse perspectives from other sports and felt the course gave them a clearer understanding of the challenges and responsibilities involved in member protection. One participant shared:

"I enjoyed the course—I feel it's given me insight into what could happen."

GRANT WRITING TRAINING - PRACTICAL SUPPORT FOR REAL OUTCOMES

Sport SA's Grant Writing workshop gave participants practical tools to navigate the often complex world of funding applications. Feedback showed that 80% of attendees were satisfied or very satisfied, with the session meeting expectations for all participants. While 20% felt the content exceeded expectations, most found it met their needs, and the presenter was rated highly for being engaging and supportive.

Participants appreciated the interactive format, the opportunity to share experiences across sports, and the presenter's flexibility and willingness to offer follow-up support. One attendee noted:

"I've already shared the session with others and plan to hold a discussion group—it was that useful."

Suggestions like avoiding jargon and offering light refreshments at future sessions were noted and appreciated, reflecting the value members place on both content and connection.

SAMMY D FOUNDATION PROGRAM - CHANGING CULTURE, SAVING LIVES

Sport SA proudly partnered with the Sammy D Foundation to deliver a powerful education program aimed at preventing violence and promoting respect in sport. The impact was clear:

100% of participants said the program will help improve and reinforce a healthy club culture.

100% became more aware of the devastating impact of a single punch.

98% believe it will help reduce bullying and violence among players.

97% said it will help curb poor spectator behaviour.

And **every single participant** recommended the program to others.

The message hit home. As one participant shared, "Our kids are always watching and modelling what we do and say. One poor choice can have devastating and wide-reaching effects." Another added, "We need this in more clubs—some coaches and parents don't realise the impact they leave on kids."

This program is more than education—it's a movement toward safer, more respectful sporting environments across South Australia.

SPORTS TRAINER TRAINING - PRACTICAL, ENGAGING, AND EXPERT LED

Participants in the Level 1 Sports Trainer Course praised the training for its hands-on approach and knowledgeable presenters. Feedback highlighted the realistic examples, engaging delivery, and the presenters' ability to make complex topics easy to understand. Ric, one of the lead trainers, was especially commended for his approachable style, expertise, and clear communication during the strapping session.

Comments reflected a strong appreciation for the presenters' lived experience and their willingness to answer all questions thoroughly. As one participant put it:

“Very well presented in an easy-to-understand manner where no question was too silly.”

The course not only built practical skills but also boosted confidence in applying them on the sidelines.

CONCLUSION - WHAT WE DELIVERED & WHAT'S NEXT

This year, Sport SA trained nearly 2,000 participants from 314 organisations, delivering workshops across metro and regional SA. From child safety to concussion, grant writing to mental health, our sessions built stronger, safer sporting communities.

We continue to listen and are willing to provide any of your training needs. New examples will include AI tips and tools, and maximising your communication, media and social media

Looking ahead, we're expanding partnerships and promoting national resources via our website, socials, and e-newsletters. With support from groups like Sammy D, SASMA, and Reconciliation SA, we're committed to delivering relevant, high-impact training that meets the evolving needs of our members.

STRENGTHENING GOVERNANCE ACROSS SPORT

In 2025, Sport SA continued its commitment to building stronger, more resilient sporting organisations through the Governance Reform Program (GRP). Designed to support State Sporting Organisations (SSOs) in improving governance practices, the program offers tailored support, expert-led education, and practical tools to help boards and executives lead with confidence.

SSOs were invited to express interest in joining the program by outlining their current governance priorities, sharing their Australian Sports Commission (ASC) Game Plan Governance Standards Report, and committing to the journey ahead. Seven organisations signed on:

Each organisation entered into a formal agreement with Sport SA, marking the start of a collaborative process to strengthen governance from the inside out.

LISTENING AND ADAPTING

A key part of the program's success has been its flexibility. Early feedback revealed that daytime sessions were difficult for volunteer directors and senior executives to attend. In response, Sport SA shifted sessions to evenings, making it easier for more people to participate meaningfully.

Leadership sessions were also refined into three focused governance modules, shaped by common themes emerging from each organisation's action plan. These sessions now run in shorter blocks—either split across two evenings or delivered in a single three-hour format—making them more accessible and less disruptive to busy schedules.

LISTENING AND ADAPTING

Education remains at the heart of the GRP. In 2025, SSOs participated in:

- Governance Masterclasses (Leadership Institute SA) – held on 13 and 27 May, with 22 participants across all seven SSOs
- SSO Action Plans – developed and implemented from May 2025 to May 2026
- Governance Topics – including Strategy Planning, Risk Management, and Board Effectiveness

ONGOING SUPPORT

Each participating SSO is supported by a dedicated Sport SA GRP Lead, who works closely with boards and executives to:

- Co-design governance action plans
- Provide implementation advice and support
- Observe board meetings and offer tailored feedback

In addition, SSOs receive complimentary access to **Risk Management Essentials**, which provides a digital platform for risk assessments and action planning.

TECHNOLOGY AND TOOLS

To help streamline governance processes, SSOs also gain access to Sport SA's licensed **TidyHQ platform**—a central hub for board and document management.

TRACKING PROGRESS

Throughout the program, SSOs track their progress against their own action plans and the ASC Game Plan Governance Standards. While self-assessments offer a snapshot, Sport SA recognises that true governance improvement is a collective effort—and continues to support SSOs from previous GRP cohorts in 2023 and 2024.

Looking ahead, Sport SA sees an opportunity to extend the GRP to local clubs, **ensuring governance support reaches every level of the sporting community.**

The Centre for Women's Sport continues to grow as a vital platform for leadership, learning and connection across South Australia's sporting community. In 2025, the program saw strong engagement, with **38 participants from 18 sports**, including regional representation and scholarship support for those facing barriers to access.

A review of the 2023 program showed a clear uplift in participant capability across technical, physical, psychological and social competencies—rising from mid-range to mid-high levels. This reflects the program's success in equipping women with the tools to lead and contribute meaningfully to sport.

PROGRAM DELIVERY AND ENGAGEMENT

- **8 core modules** delivered with flexible scheduling to support volunteers and professionals
- **Elective modules** offered to deepen learning and support ongoing development
- Each module evaluated to ensure relevance and quality



COMMUNITY AND CONNECTION

- A dedicated **WhatsApp** group fosters peer support and ongoing connection
- **Alumnae Advisory Group** established to guide future direction
- **Graduation hosted at Government House**, honouring 26 graduates
- **Ambassadors reappointed**, with **Jessica Stenson OLY** joining the team
- **Scholarships launched** in memory of **Ashleigh Young**, supporting future participants



VISIBILITY & IMPACT

- The Centre showcased at major conferences and events across the state
- Two **Women in Sport Network (WISN)** events attracted 370 attendees
- Partnerships formed with leading organisations including **UniSA, Australian Sports Commission, Minerva Network,** and international bodies

The Centre continues to evolve, with a clear focus on building leadership, fostering inclusion, and creating lasting change for women in sport.

FESTIVAL OF SPORT



A CELEBRATION OF CONNECTION, INSPIRATION AND INDUSTRY LEADERSHIP

What began as an annual conference to foster connection and knowledge-sharing across South Australia’s sporting sector evolved into something truly special in 2025.

Originally scheduled for early May, the Festival of Sport was rescheduled to 22–23 May to seize a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity: welcoming Olympic icon **Cathy Freeman OAM** to Adelaide. Her visit, aligned with an event hosted by the Australia Day Council, gave Sport SA the chance to create a moment that would **resonate far beyond the conference room**, as over two days, **more than 330 attendees from 100+ organisations** came together to celebrate sport’s power to unite, inspire and lead change.

The program opened with a moving Welcome to Country by Uncle Mickey O’Brien, followed by an evening hosted by Ali Clarke, featuring **Bruce McAvaney OAM** and **Cathy Freeman OAM**—who re-lived one of our most iconic moment’s in Australian sport, her 400m gold-medal winning run at the Sydney Olympics.



Day two delivered a dynamic and thought-provoking conference program, exploring themes of **inclusion, legacy, innovation** and the future of sport. Highlights included:

- **Participation for All:** Launch of the Sports Network, inclusive sport pathways, and Paralympic journeys
- **Future Events & Legacy:** Insights into Brisbane 2032, redefining legacy through major events, and strategic planning
- **Funding, Technology & AI:** Exploring private giving, cyber-smart innovation and AI’s role in sport management

From grassroots to elite, from policy to practice, the Festival of Sport showcased the depth and diversity of South Australia’s sporting community. It was a celebration of ideas, leadership and the shared belief that sport can—and should—be a force for good.



A NEW CHAPTER FOR THE SOUTH AUSTRALIAN SPORT AWARDS

For the first time in its history, the South Australian Sport Awards opened the Festival of Sport—**bringing two major celebrations together under one banner**. Traditionally held as a stand-alone event in November, the Awards were reimagined as the festival's opening night, creating a powerful moment to honour excellence while welcoming the broader sporting community.

This change wasn't just about timing—it was about connection. By combining the Awards with the Festival, we reduced the number of separate events for industry attendees and created a bigger platform to celebrate our sporting champions, reach new audiences, and spark deeper conversations about the future of sport in South Australia.

The South Australian Sport Awards **shine a light on the people who make sport great**—from athletes and coaches, to volunteers and administrators. Each category, supported by valued sponsors, recognises the passion, dedication and impact of those who help sport thrive across our state.

SAMMY D FOUNDATION - COMMUNITY IMPACT AWARD

The Community Impact Award will recognise and acknowledge the work of a Group, Committee or Club whose event(s) or program(s) have contributed to the community by providing a positive experience for participants and created legacy outcomes for ongoing participation in sport.

The Community Impact Award goes to a sporting event or program held in South Australia (SA) in 2024. A nominated event or program may involve local, regional, state, national or international competitors, single or multi-sports, and be contested by individuals and teams, professionals or amateurs. Above all, it has to set itself apart from other events or programs through its high standard of organisation and its resounding success.

The event or program must demonstrate a significant impact on community values, awareness of the sport, or significant economic benefits. The state organisation must show true involvement in the event.

From 3–6 April, Port Augusta proudly hosted the **2025 South Australian Masters Games**, welcoming athletes, officials, volunteers, and visitors from across the state. Originally scheduled for the following week, the event was brought forward to avoid clashing with the AFL’s Gather Round, ensuring the Games could shine without competing for attention, resources, or community support.

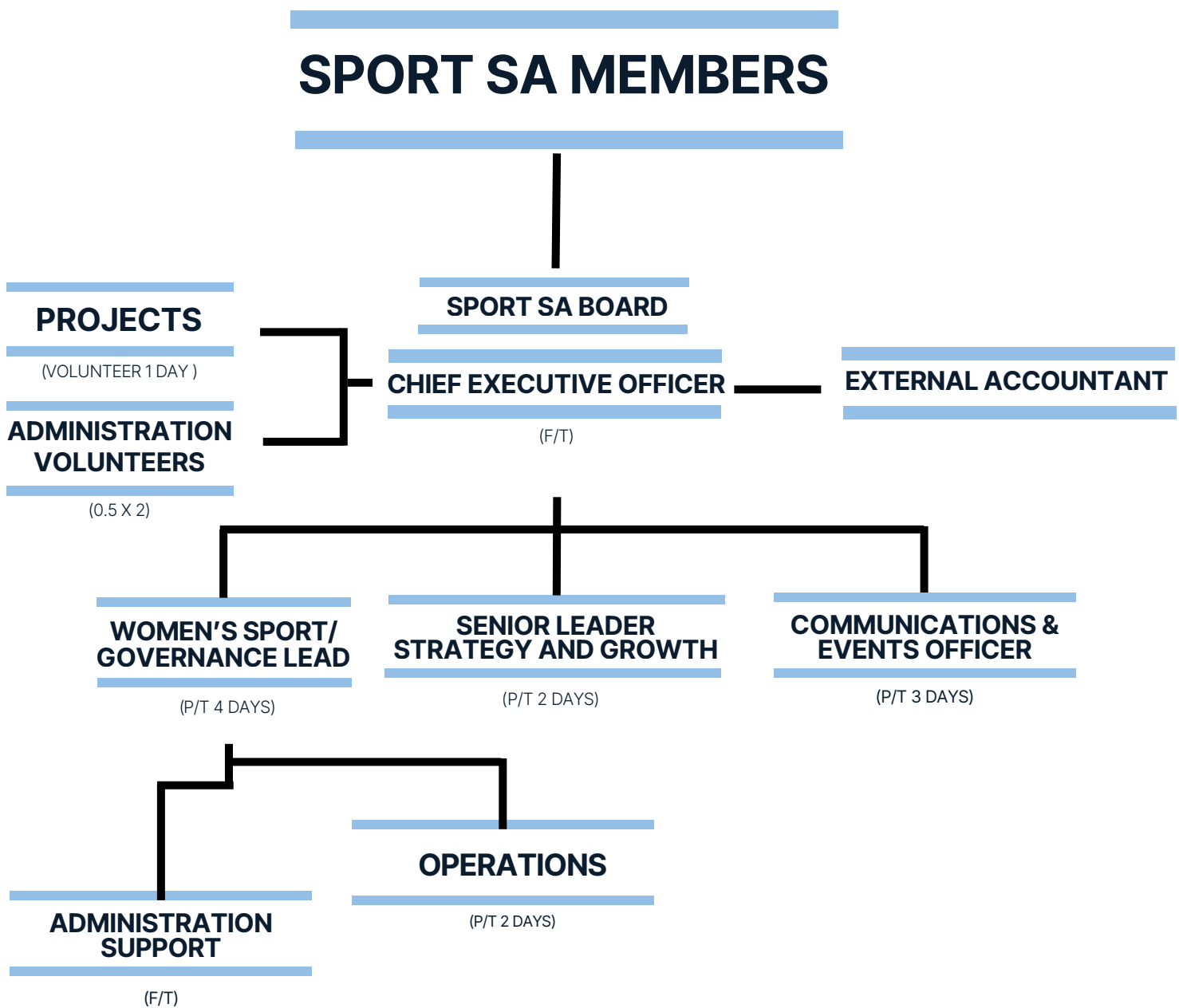

1. Summary of Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

a. This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act and the members of the Incorporated Association.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 1016: Leases

MSB1031: Materiality

AASB110: Events after the Balance Sheet Date

No other Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of noncurrent assets.

The following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this report:

b. Property, Plant and Equipment Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost. All assets, excluding freehold land and buildings, are depreciated over their useful lives to the Incorporated Association.

c. Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in first-out basis and include direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenses.

d. Finance leases are capitalised by recognising an asset and a liability at the lower of the amount equal to the fair value of the leases property or the present value of the minimum lease payments. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period. Lease assets are depreciated on a straight-line bases over their lease term.

As appointed auditor on the financial statements for the year ended 30th June 2025 I am obliged to express to you the committee, my view on the presentation of the financial report and internal controls as a whole. I am very comfortable with the way the financial report for the year has been presented, and I believe that the figures have been appropriately represented and are a true and fair view of what has occurred during the year.

I also wish to express my satisfaction with the way the records are kept and would like to thank the Mary-Anne Trevaskis for her helpfulness during the audit.

There is one item that came to my attention during the audit:

Internal Controls on Credit Card spending

In my review of the internal controls of the organisation and spending it has come to my attention that there is no real internal controls around the credit card. I believe it would be appropriate for formal policies to be created about the approval and spending on these cards and documenting evidence in relation to the spending. This was a point that was made in the 2024 Management Letter and does not seem to have been adequately addressed. There seems to have been an ad-hoc system to providing receipts and no clear direction on how the credit cards are to be used for spending. Can you please as a matter of course create a policy around this that addresses how the Credit Cards are to be used, what they are to be used for and ensuring that there is a clear policy around collecting receipts and verifying the expenses? Can you please provide this to me once it has been created and approved.

Other than the above issue, there are no other items that have come to my attention.

Please feel free to contact me at any time should you wish to discuss any aspect of the audit or have any areas of concern.
